

Clubs and Activities Offered at CCHS

Art Club – This club has open enrollment to art and non-art students, grades 9-12. Students work on art projects that are generally not presented in our art classes. The club has been responsible for seasonally painting the front windows of CCHS. Club will also take art related field trips to a variety of locations.

Astronomy Club - The Astronomy Club was organized at the request of students so that they could explore topics concerning the solar system and the universe outside of the classroom. The club meets at least twice a month after school in addition to the monthly activity period meetings. Some of the activities include hosting guest speakers, watching videos related to space topics, doing activities to understand the solar system (e.g., phases of the moon) better, and taking field trips. The field trips include evening skyviewing opportunities with a professor from Northern Kentucky University (usually twice a year) and nighttime excursions to the Cincinnati Observatory.

Beta Club – Beta Club is an Honor Society and Community Service organization. Open to sophomores through seniors with 3.2 unweighted GPA or 4.0 weighted GPA. Students must meet application requirements. Fall membership drive.

Book and Media Club – Members have numerous opportunities to read and discuss current books and explore other media such as Manga & Anime, films, music, video games, and websites. Lunchtime book/media discussions, field trips, and gaming tournaments are some of the activities. Open to grades 9-12.

CCHS Chamber Choir –

CCHS Speech Team – This team is affiliated with the Kentucky High School Speech League (KHSSL). It is a competitive group open to students, 9-12 grades, during a fall enrollment. This club prepares and participates in local and state speech and dramatic presentation performances including debate. Students must sign a contract and agree to participate in all activities in order to remain a member of the team. Students practice for one hour per week after school during the season. (October through March.)

Chess Club – Chess anyone? This club has open membership for grades 9-12.

Creative Writing - The creative writing club creates, publishes, advertises, and distributes the CCHS Literary and Art Magazine, *Not So Subliminal Messages*. At meetings, members are encouraged to share their own creative writing. Members will also critique and provide feedback to other student writers.

DECA – DECA, the association of marketing students, has been leading talented young people toward real careers and lifetime skills. Open to grades 9-12. If you are interested in sports and entertainment marketing, in the travel or hospitality business, in fashion, in a retail career, in advertising, or in the restaurant trade, this is the club for you. Activities and skills in these and any other marketing specialty are available to you in DECA. DECA offers hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships and educational programs. DECA participates on the regional and state level. The application process takes place in the fall.

Do Something Club –

CCHS Drama - Produces three shows each season: a drama, comedy, and musical. All Campbell County High School students are welcome to audition. There are opportunities for students to work both on and off stage. CCHS Drama aims to provide students with authentic experiences in theater, and produce shows that offer both our students and our audience a rich and diverse view of drama. CCHS Drama is a member of the *International Thespian Society*, an honorary that recognizes high school students for outstanding work in theater, and the *Cappies* program, a national “critics and awards” program that adds excitement and public acclaim to high school theater. The extracurricular program is supported by courses in the fine arts department, including Mr. Bertucci’s Introduction to Theater, Drama, and Select Drama, and Ms.

Rose's Chorus and Select Chorus. Drama Club meets on Activity Day each month, when information about auditions, field trips, and other club activities are discussed.

Sports Writing Club – Students submit sports-related articles for the CCHS athletics central website, camelpride.com. All are welcome to come and experience writing with a journalistic flair.

Student Technology Leadership Program (STLP) – Meets on activity day as well as other meetings after school. Real life experiences/projects having to do with technology at all levels. We create a technology presentation to share at and attend the regional and state conferences. Enrollment is open to all students in the fall.

Student Council – Discuss school related issues as they affect students. Works to improve student morale, fundraises for class projects, and sends a representative to the SBDM council to share student perspectives. Membership is open in the fall. Grades 9-12.

TSA - Technology Student Association – Open registration, grades 9-12. Students must be taking a technology course during the current year. Meets on activity day as well as after school. Main activities involve preparing for competitive events and building leadership skills. Competitive areas include: Architecture, Construction, Research and Design, Problem Solving, Engineering, and Transportation.
